

Give thanks in all things....

1 Thessalonians 5:18

Stewardship – the responsible and careful management of something entrusted to one's care such as natural resources, finances or property. Webster's Dictionary

Dear Church Family,

As the leaves change and the air begins to turn crisp, November invites us into a season of gratitude. It is a time to pause and remember the countless ways God's blessings are all around us. We not only give thanks for the harvest of the land and all the produce we enjoy this time of year; we also give thanks for being part of a **faithful**, **hopeful** and **loving** community.

Every Sunday it is clear that our abundance overflows as the church is full, our Sunday school classes are well attended, our choir is flourishing, and our media continues to reach those who cannot join us. We are a blessed church. Watch for these three words in the months ahead: "faithful, hopeful and loving," it is our logo for this year's stewardship campaign.

It is a great exercise to do with kids on a long car trip and a great format for journaling. It may seem silly, but I have done it, and it is a wonderful exercise. Simple gratitude lists show us all the things we may overlook that make our lives so full. Let me know how you do.

Reflections on the Quote...

But he said to them, "How many loaves do you have? Go look!" Mark 6:30

Many, many years ago I read The Silver Chalace by Thomas B. Costain. In fact. I have read it several times over the years. For a time, the author's retelling of the story troubled me. It seemed to question the miracle of the loaves and fishes found in the Gospel of Mark. When it noted that people of the times went off on an adventure like going to hear Jesus speak they often carried food with them. So, noting the sharing of food among the crowd didn't negate the miracle but strengthened it. When the disciples could collect only five fish and five loaves from a crowd of thousands, it truly was a miracle that the same thousands shared so that everyone was fed, with even a generous amount left over.

I remember rationing during World War II, the long lines at the meat market with everyone holding their ration card, hoping there would be something left when they go to the counter. I held my mother's place in line while she ran other errands hoping she'd get back before I got to the counter.

Maybe some of you remember food economies like scrapple and Spam. I don't really remember scrapple except that it came in a can, and I liked it. I still make a dish with Spam—it's good too.

My mother made a hast that she called red flannel hash. My brother and I called it om's clean the refrigerator hast. That hash had an awesome list of ingredients that were different every time she made it.

It started out with canned corned beef hash and potatoes were always added. It got its red color from the beets. That mess

mess of odds and ends was one of our favorite meals. The cans were cleaned, crushed, and collected for the war effort.

Everyone had a Victory Garden and tried to do their part for the war effort. Small efforts, big results.

Just like the miracle of the loaves and fishes, our efforts over time will produce results. If we give the little we have with effort and love behind it, just watch what God can do!

Lord, when I place in You my smallest trust, You bless and increase it.
